The small community of Riverside, about a mile east of Rock Creek, came into existence in the fall of 1897. Malcolm McCuaig, a co-owner of the Boundary Hotel in Midway, had built a new hotel at this location. His new Riverside Hotel was on the the main travel route from Penticton and the Okanagan to the mining camps in the Boundary and West Kootenay. Riverside proved an ideal stopping point for stage drivers and horse teams travelling from Fairview to Greenwood via Camp McKinney.

McCuaig died in 1900 and the hotel was purchased by his friend and partner Sam Larsen. Larsen built a sizeable barn and enlarged the livery stable to accommodate thirty six horses. He also built a community hall next to the hotel for dances, weddings, fairs and other gatherings and entertainment. The success of the hotel and hall encouraged further business activity in Riverside.

Tom Hansen built a general store with a warehouse that handled items such as hardware, stoves, shoes, clothing and groceries. When Hansen later moved to Rock Creek, this store became the Rock Creek Trading Company and was managed by Owen Wheeler.

Harry Green was one of the first residents of Riverside and he built a blacksmith shop beside his home on the west end of town. Blacksmithing proved a lucrative trade in those early days when everyone had a team of horses, and the stage coach was the means of travel prior to the railroad and the automobile. William O'Donnell bought out Green early on and operated the blacksmith shop/garage for many years after.

Arthur Keen had a Corral, slaughter house and butcher shop on the eastern side of town. When his whole operation burned down, brothers James and Robert Kerr, salvaged the weigh scales and a few other items and rebuilt. For years, Kerr Bros meat was found throughout the Boundary.

In 1910, the Saint Mary's Anglican Church was built in Riverside, but was later moved by Howard Pannell to the nearby English community of Kettle Valley.

In a relatively short period of time, the community of Riverside became a centre of bustling activity. However, the close proximity to rival Rock Creek and a vast reduction in mining activity in the Boundary, proved its downfall. Businesses closed, buildings were torn down and families moved elsewhere. Today, like so many other towns that have come and gone, one would never know Riverside existed.

During her career, which began about 40 years ago, she had contact with the Medical Centre even before the current facilities were officially opened in December 1977. She assisted Dr. Gable as was needed, while health services were delivered in the Rock Creek PUB prior to the opening of the current facility. Over the years,

she assisted a number of doctors such as Dr. Leavitt, the first female doctor to work at the Rock Creek Clinic, Dr. Keith White, Dr. Mary Wall for 15 years (both at the Rock Creek clinic as well as her Midway office), Dr. Lowe for 3 years, Dr. Ageryo for 4 years, Dr. Hamilton, Dr. Craig Springate, Dr. Mike Furgirski for a very short time via Telehealth and now 6 years with our Nurse Practitioner, Celia Evanson. She assumed the position of Medical Office Assistant from Rita Hall who was instrumental in getting the Medical Clinic started.

During these many years, she has seen and was involved with and adapted to the various changes seen at the Medical Clinic both in staffing, hours of operation, and upgrading of the facility. Before Celia Evanson came, physician services at the

Medical Clinic were available for basically two half days per week. With the coming of Celia Evanson, Interior Health approved funding initially for the delivery of health care services in Rock Creek to three full days and later expanded that to 4 days a week. Not only did Bonnie willingly and happily adjust to these added hours, but she also adjusted to working for an increased number of staff going from one

physician to now two Nurse Practitioners, one Social Worker, one nurse and a specialized medical doctor. In addition, she assisted in implementing COVID-19 guidelines when COVID was declared a pandemic in March 2020. In reviewing all of this, Bonnie was a major player in the development of a Medical Clinic and its services that we have today.



TRAILS TO THE BOUNDARY
