Greenwood Post Office Celebrates 110 Years of Service

Step back in time and into history—Greenwood's iconic Post Office is marking its 110th year of continuous service! But long before it became a centre of communication, the site had a very different role.

Originally, this prime piece of property was owned by my great uncle, John William "Billie" Nelson, a true pioneer who opened Greenwood's very first hotel—the Pioneer Hotel—in 1896. Back then, it was hailed as the finest accommodation in town, proudly offering loft space for six men. Though the building underwent three renovations, a major shift came in 1910 when Greenwood's City Council drastically slashed the number of liquor licenses from 26 to just 5. Ever perceptive, Billie saw the writing on the wall and sold the land to the federal government.

Construction of the new Post Office was slow, delayed by World War I supply shortages. The original plans called for a grander clock tower, but a shortage of brick forced a more modest design. Still, on May 18, 1915, the Greenwood Post Office officially opened its doors—and it's been serving the community ever since.

One of its crown jewels is the clock, one of only four shipped from England to Canada in 1914. Over a century later, it still keeps accurate time and chimes on the hour. Inside, visitors are treated to beautifully preserved historic details: soaring 16-foot ceilings, intricate mosaic floors, original desks and countertops, and gleaming brass mailboxes engraved with "DOC" for Dominion of Canada. The original safe can now be seen just outside the entrance to the Greenwood Museum and Visitors Centre.

Upstairs, the building once housed Greenwood's second Customs House, complete with original furnishings and cozy living quarters for the postmaster. And it you believe the stories, one former resident may never have left—some say a ghostly figure still appears in the upstairs windows.

If you're a fan of history or the paranormal, don't miss the chance to explore Greenwood's past through one of our guided walking tours: Looking Back in Time or The Ghosts of Greenwood. The Post Office is more than just a building—it's a living piece of our community's rich, storied past.



RCBFA PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE -Dean Corbett

At the last fall fair, a friend stopped to visit with me after the opening ceremonies. We talked for a while, then he remarked that he was concerned with the high price of admission. I was somewhat surprised and did not say much. So, this month I will write about what a great value admission to our fair is, and how you can make that value even better!

I believe the adults' admission will be about \$20–22 (this has not yet been determined by the RCBFA BOD and Membership). What does that get you? Let's start with the entertainment on the dais which runs from about 9:30 am to 10 pm on Saturday and Sunday ends at about 4:30. This year we have bands like Barracuda (Heart Tribute), Johnny and June (Cash Tribute), as well as several duos and groups from our boundary area. Tribute bands at the Oliver mini theatre usually cost about \$30 per ticket for an evening concert. Weekend tickets to the Shambala Festival in Salmo are \$540 per adult including camping and parking!

Our parking is free, camping is reasonable, food is quite expensive if you choose to buy it, but there are many other things you can do than eat, listen and park! Chris the Clown is a popular interactive experience for young and old alike! We have open and 4H livestock shows, arena entertainment including lawnmower races, equine events and gymkhana, the ever-popular Super Dogs, vendor field, local artisan market, a variety of food vendors, baking, sewing, quilting, pickling, artwork, and other pavilion displays are there to see and appreciate. Locally grown flowers and vegetables festoon the agricultural building while the Cowboys' Rest has great scarecrows to visit with and a place to cool down out of the sun (let's hope for sun!). This and more are all included in the price of admission!

Food isn't free or cheap you may say, but at the RC Fall Fair you are allowed to bring your own food and non-alcoholic beverages onto the grounds. Unlike at some ski hills where you are confined to special bag lunch areas, and professional sports arenas or movie theatres where food from home is prohibited, at our fair you may eat your homemade picnics wherever you choose. We even have a bottle filling station so you can fill 'er up with fresh water for free!

I realize that tickets to the carnival rides and games are somewhat expensive, but not if your kids enter and happen to win the scarecrow contest or some of the children's aggregate events. Ride wristbands are included for winning some children's class prizes! We often have "door prize" wrist bands at the pre-fair work bees. Ordering wristbands ahead and on-line gets you a discount. We may not have the PNE rollercoaster (which was born four years after I was and is still going strong but looks and sounds as rickety as I do), but we do have exciting and interesting rides and games for all ages.

Enter lots of free entry exhibition classes and you can earn prize money. Yes, our entry fees for almost every class are free! Entering classes involves some planning and work but I always find it exciting to see what place my project(s) achieve.

One of the best ways to economize at the fair is to volunteer your skills, time, and energy at the pre-fair weekend work bees on Sept 6th & 7th. Each day you volunteer for 4+ hours to help set up the grounds, you receive a day pass admission. We welcome help from singles to families with their kids and their grandparents!

You can start saving up now for a big splurge or formulate your family plan to spend as little as possible. It is your and your family's choice how much or little you budget for at the RC Fall Fair! So, get on with your plans and get ready for a great, affordable family experience on Sept 13 & 14 this year!







The Lost Gold Bars of Camp McKinney

The date was Tuesday, August 18, 1896, when the co-owner of the Cariboo Mine, George McAuley, decided that he would deliver the gold from the mine to Midway where it would be shipped to the San Francisco mint. Usually, they delivered the gold once a month or so. About three miles from town, he made a quick stop as there was a masked man with a Winchester pointing at him. McAuley was asked to throw the saddlebag (which held three bricks of gold weighing 656 1/2 ounces) down to the ground. While looking down a barrel of a Winchester, McAuley obliged and threw down the saddlebag with the gold.

The robber warned the driver to drive on and not to turn back. McAuley then drove to Midway to report the crime, but the police were out of town. James Monahan (McAuley's partner) checked to see if any of the workers were missing, they were all there. McAuley then went to Midway to report the robbery to the Provincial Police while Monahan organized a posse and headed to the scene of the robbery. The posse couldn't find anything. Later Constables William McMynn and Isaac Dinsmore arrived at Camp McKinney and asked a few questions and were then taken to the scene of the robbery. They found the saddlebag, biscuits, a partial bottle of whiskey, some raw eggs, and some water in a bottle. The robber had been waiting for a while. A reward was issued. It wasn't long before Monahan got a letter.

That letter was later published in the November 14, 1896, issue of the Grand Forks Miner. The letter read as follows:

"I met a man in a saloon in Oroville at about the end of May. We fell to drinking together and he told me that his name was Matthew Roderick, from Seattle, that he was very hard up and on his way to get the bullion from Camp McKinney, an easy job, he said".

"He had a gun, a Winchester I think, and was going to stage a holdup. He liked the way I held my liquor, said I'd be one with a cool head and wanted me to come in with him on the job. I didn't want to. Roderick said he was a dead shot and he wouldn't hesitate to kill me if I revealed what passed between us that night".

"We went to Camp McKinney where we both got work. After we had been working three months, and nothing happened, I left for Trail Creek late in August. After I'd been there three days I read an account of the robbery of the Camp McKinney bullion in the Spokesman Review, so I thought I'd better let you know about Roderick"...

Well Monahan checked the records and found that Roderick did work at Camp McKinney, lived in an old shack at the edge of town, and always gambled his money away. Before the robbery Roderick had a bad back and was off work. A few days after the robbery he decided to go back home to Seattle to recuperate. The miners felt sorry for him and collected \$90 for his trip home. According to the miners Roderick left on the stage back to Seattle with just a blanket. Roderick also told Keane that he would come back to work when he felt better, and Keane agreed.

The Cariboo Mining Company reached out to The Pinkertons Detective Agency in Washington. They had no trouble locating Roderick in the directory as a civil engineer. They had a lady agent move in next door to Roderick and once in a while they had a little talk. She found out that Roderick had paid off some back taxes and took out a \$3,000 insurance policy. Mrs. Roderick also told the agent that her husband was going to leave on a business trip that would make them rich. All the evidence pointed to Roderick as the robber, but the company was more interested in getting their gold bars back. They now suspected that Roderick took the small gold bar (hidden in the blanket) and buried the large gold bricks, as they were quite heavy and would be easily noticed.

About three months later Roderick decided to go back to Camp McKinney. Unaware that he was followed, Roderick traveled by train to Concully, Washington, where he bought a horse and rode North to the Boundary of BC.

Camp McKinney was preparing a welcoming party for Matthew Roderick's arrival. They placed armed men guarding every approach to the Town. Graham and a fellow called Alexine (or Long Alex) were hidden at the forks of the Sidley and Fairview Roads. From this point they had an excellent view of the surrounding countryside. Alexine spotted Roderick. rode back to town to tell the Provincial Police. McMynn told Keane (company superintendent) to rehire Roderick as well as anyone that comes with him. He would have provincial Police watching Roderick. Armed the two police and superintendent Keane set off down the trail. By this time, it was about 10 pm and dark. As they traveled further, they could hear a horse approaching. They waited until Roderick came closer. Keane called in the dark "is that you Matt?". Roderick answered "yes". He turned around to face Keane with his Winchester in his hand. Keane thought he was pointing the gun at him. Keane then drew his revolver and shot

Roderick. At the same time Dean (one of

the policemen) also fired at Roderick thinking that Roderick had fired at Keane. Well, Keane's bullet killed Roderick.

Later Keane had testified that Roderick was pointing the gun at him, but when they checked Roderick's rifle it had a rag stuffed in the muzzle and it was quite rusty. Roderick had buried his guns at the time of the robbery. Under Roderick's coat they found a special vest made with two pockets under each armpit large enough for the gold bricks to fit into. Keane was brought to trial in Vernon on June of 1897. He was found guilty of manslaughter and sentenced to one day in jail. If Roderick buried his weapons, you would think that the gold bricks would also be buried nearby.

Some interesting facts according to the court documents:

- On Roderick's body they found a will made out to his wife, some paper money, 3 candles, twenty dollars worth of gold coins, a hand gun, and two pieces of gold. The gold was later checked and found to be 625/1000 to 634/1000 pure, which matched the gold bricks that were missing. The whiskey bottle that was found at the robbery site matched some bottles that were at Roderick's cabin. The vest with the special pockets, (called a "smugglers vest") was, in those days quite common for miners to wear them.
- One thing that is for certain, the robbery did take place and the gold has never been found. Somewhere around McMynn's Meadows about three miles from Camp McKinney, there are two gold bricks buried, in a shallow hole waiting to be discovered.







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
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
